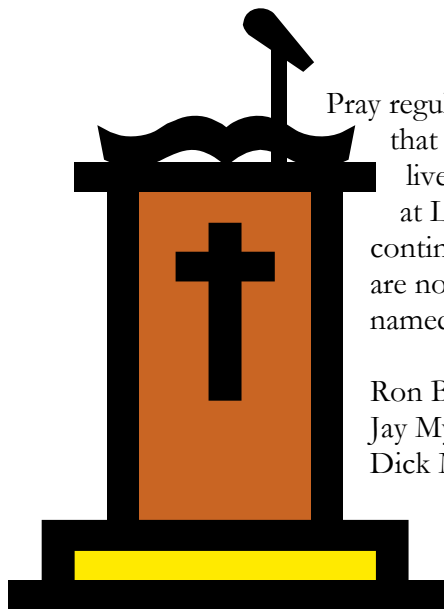

## OUTREACH STORY

### “THE CURSED FOREST”

Sunday March 1st, I was dressed like a Togolese would dress to go to church and one of our visitors/guests asked me where I was from. I said, “Togo, Africa.” He then asked me if I was here for the missions conference. It was then that I realized I was wearing an unusual outfit for an American. I smiled and said I live here. Maybe I could have reached out to him by saying, “Yes I was converted in Africa and came on a mission to the US because the harvest is plentiful!”

I remember back in the early 70s, how many people made fun of missionaries arriving among them. But it was worse a century earlier. Many of them lost their lives. For some of them, the autochthones came out determined to kill them without soiling their hands. Because the missionaries were asking for a piece of land, they gave them the cursed forest.

The cursed forest was believed to be the dwelling of bad spirits. And anybody banned from the community found refuge there: witches, lepers, murderers, people possessed by bad spirits. The autochthones were scared to go into the cursed forest. Nobody had ever come back alive from the cursed forest and the autochthones were convinced that they had condemned the missionaries to a certain death.

The missionaries took possession of the cursed forest and not only did they survive, but it was not long before they converted those excluded from the society they found in there. With the help of the newly converted, they built churches and worshiped God. The autochthones were so convinced that they would die in the hands of the bad spirits that when it did not happen, doubt sneaked into the society.

If those people are still alive, it is surely because their God is more powerful than the gods of the cursed forest. Slowly but surely, conversion started to take place. And we know the rest of the story.

Today, we still have vast field of mission and the harvest is plentiful. Missions is the ultimate outreach sacerdotal sacrifice. We may not all be missionaries, but we can still be part of the mission by supporting missions through our giving and praying.

## How to Use the “Caring Bridge” program for keeping family and friends informed in times of crisis

The world of electronics has ways we can keep in touch with each other—anywhere. One of the nicest and most effective tools for doing this is CaringBridge, a web site for a free listing of people needing support. With CaringBridge you can list a person with on-going problems and keep friends up-to-date about their condition. What makes this facility so wonderful, is that anyone you select can communicate with that person. By reporting their condition, including events or milestones in a commentary, people can sign in and access the status of the listed person. The patient on “CaringBridge” can access notes to cheer them up and appreciate that others care about them.

You will be in control of notifying people about changing conditions or events of interest so they can respond to the patient with their wishes or news of interest. The patient can get many and instant “Get well” messages during their convalescence. While they are isolated from family and friends they can exchange greetings that make the loneliness less oppressive. It is suggested that someone close to the patient manage the CaringBridge site so timely accurate reports are released, and control is kept on who is “in the loop.” CaringBridge makes it easy for all parties. The site caretaker can put in messages regarding relevant news, and monitor the messages and comments.

The CaringBridge site is easy to access at: <http://www.caringbridge.org> To build a project for a patient they need some elementary information, simply fill in the blanks when you begin the program, to quote

CaringBridge: “Creating a CaringBridge site is easy. Complete 3 simple steps, and you’ll have an active site in just 5 minutes.

Step 1-Give us some basic information about yourself and your loved one.

Step 2-Choose a site style that fits your needs.

Step 3-Select privacy settings for your CaringBridge site.”

If you need help, call the church office (582-5686), and they will put you in contact with someone to assist you. Here is a sample of a current (March 10, 2009 CaringBridge notice. If you try it soon, you will be able to see how it works.

This sample is a notice from the March 10th prayer list:

*Tim Klaus is continuing to improve. Carolyn reports (on her Caringbridge posts) that he is breathing without the ventilator during certain periods of the day, and is increasingly responsive to her.*

Generally the site caretaker puts up one or more photos of the patient—a humorous photo of them in a familiar pose, or even, as in this case, the car wreck that put Tim in the hospital. It is always interesting to read the many heart-felt messages from people who care. Listing the CareBridge site at church may find caring friends you did not know they had. We could even keep a list on a designated web page for people outside our reach who check up on us electronically. Anyone can list the CaringBridge site with the person’s name, only the site caretaker can control what is on the site and who does what. Note some of the addresses on Tim’s “guestbook” messages (FL to MN, 121 messages—that would make anyone feel better.) Also notice the statistics on the use of this web site!

You are encouraged to send Tim a note while he is recuperating. “Free, personalized websites that support and connect loved ones during critical illness, treatment and recovery.” <http://www.caringbridge.org>
